A Pastoral Letter from the West Midlands Moderator

The sudden death of David Littlejohns has come as an enormous shock to us all. It hardly seems possible that having celebrated his induction to ministry at the "Cadbury" pastorate only at the end of January this year, we have had to say goodbye to him. Of course our immediate concerns are for Hilary and their family. But the loss is acute for the three churches as well.

I had heard good and encouraging reports of the pastoral care and leadership that he was exercising. David arrived into the pastorate after a reasonable vacancy, and I know that some of you felt that the vacancy was too long! Even without the tragedy of this bereavement, none of you would be looking forward to starting that particular process again, and neither am I. Yet that is where we find ourselves.

We shall come to that in due course, but first, as our funeral service liturgy says, let us grieve for one already loved and now lost to us, "but not as those without hope." Those left behind feel the real pain of separation, but for David there is the joy of everlasting life with our Lord.

It is ok to admit that we are hurting. It is good to share our weakness, our vulnerability. It is essential, at any time but especially now, to draw together as a church family to bear one another's burdens. The Elders of the three churches will be vital in providing pastoral care in the coming months, but please – those of you who are not serving Elders – find ways to support them, and offer help rather than waiting to be asked. Have faith: you will come through this season of bereavement.

Thank you to those who have already offered support to Hilary in tangible ways and with expressions of love and your prayers. I know that they have meant a huge amount to them. Please continue in this.

David has made a difference, and changed your lives just by being amongst you, even if for only a few months. He has achieved God's purposes for his ministry there. "Well done, good and faithful servant.... Come and share your Master's happiness."

TRAIDCRAFT SALES

We have had Traidcraft sales at Weoley Hill Church for many years. I took over the operation from Sue and Joyce Cope almost exactly 11 years ago. During my time running the monthly Sunday stall, supplying the kitchen here with tea and coffee and making an appearance at fairs, coffee mornings etc., quite apart from the money from the sales that goes to Traidcraft, we have made donations of almost £1000 directly to Traidcraft from our profits. So it has been a very worthwhile operation.

However, it may be that the time has come to have a rethink. Clearly Traidcraft's costs have risen considerably in the last few years and this has had to be passed on to the customer, so many of the goods have become very expensive. Although sales of Christmas cards remain healthy as always, sales of food items have gone down, partly because of rising costs but also because we have gradually lost many members who were good customers. Also, it is now very easy to buy Fairtrade products in the shops, and Traidcraft goods specifically can be bought from the Oxfam shop in Harborne, from the Cotteridge church and from Carrs Lane church, as well as by mail order from a catalogue or online from the Traidcraft online shop.

Following the discussion we had at church meeting on 17 September, when several members agreed that the time had come to scale down the sales, I am proposing that we continue with the Christmas card sales and supplying the kitchen where possible, but that we discontinue the monthly Sunday food sales. This should mean that we can continue to call ourselves a 'Fairtrade Church'.

I would love to hear anyone's views on this, particularly if you feel strongly that we should continue – but if you have this view I hope you will be prepared to support the stall in the future!
