From the Church Secretary

Some of us are very glad to see the back of 2017. Of course it has been a mixed year, as all years and all times are, but too much of this one seems like a continuation of the worst of 2016, and there have been too many losses. There are the deaths—Val Cotgreave, Len Fisher, Robert Cope, Jean Greening, Brian Wood, and of course the death of the minister, David Littlejohns, so soon after his ministry with us had started. And some of our older members are no longer able to worship with us, having moved into care facilities during the past year or so—Corinne Dawson, José Marsland and Edna Bayliss.

At the start of 2017, we didn't think we would be back in vacancy at the start of 2018, with all that means.

It's hard to keep going after one blow, never mind a series of blows. It's hard to see where God's will can be—or how God can will tragedies, whether personal or global. It can hurt or make us angry when people trot out platitudes about 'all things work for good', even if they are Biblical platitudes. And it's just plain hard work to be done by ever fewer hands.

Last January we were praying for Ian Ring's recovery from illness and anticipating David's ministry, but some things are the same,

We still need to take a hard, realistic, prayerful look at where we are and what lies ahead. The elders are formulating some Mission Pledges for the next few years, based on the challenges we face and the priorities (such as youth and family work) that we have already identified. We will revamp our Profile in line with this, As Weoley Hill and as part of the Cadbury Pastorate, we need to pray, to adapt, to listen, to be willing to give up what we have 'always done' to further our work and witness. We have to

accept that nothing human is perfect, but to hope and pray for the best.



Looking to the future:

Monday evenings are no longer a good time for the *very* small Prayer Group, so this needs to be re-scheduled and perhaps rethought. While prayer does not depend on being in a particular place at a particular time, it is good to pray together.

We hope to arrange a second First Aid training session.

I hope to arrange a visit from the local organiser of *Open the Book*, to tell us more about how volunteers are bringing the Bible to life for primary children, and how we can be involved in this Bible Society project—the slide show and script for *The longest journey*, as presented by Junior Church, are examples of the Bible Society's work for youngsters. This could also be an opportunity not just to work together as a pastorate, but ecumenically with other local churches.

During Lent, there will be a series of ecumenical talks with discussion on *Faith in the workplace*—Ted Forgan is part of the panel—which will take place here on Wednesday evenings. We hope to have a Tuesday afternoon Bible Study as well, so if anyone knows of good study materials, please pass the information on.
