From the Minister's study—

Easter Message

Good news and bad news, or bad news and good news

“I’ve got good news....and bad news. What do you want to hear first?” Many of us have on time or other heard and used these words in our day to day life. Some of us will say, “bad news first” hoping that the good news after will make up for the bad news we heard first. Others will say, “good news first” in order to postpone the bad news just a bit longer. Usually I prefer to hear the bad news first because it makes the good news seem so much better. I always hope that the good news will outshine the bad news although it is true that at times the bad news seems to overshadow the good news. But not at Easter! Easter is good news, the news that “Christ is risen, he is risen indeed!” and we can joyfully sing “Thine be the glory, risen conquering Son, endless is the victory thou o’er death has won”.

But what about the bad news? What about Good Friday and the pain of Jesus’ suffering? Without Good Friday, no Easter. Good Friday is bad news, very bad news, but it is undeniably part of the good news that followed on the first Easter when the women who had come to the tomb found it empty. While they could not imagine that any good news could follow the bad news they had witnessed, there they were told by an angel that Jesus had been raised from the dead. The good news had conquered the bad news! Instead of the story ending in great sadness and despair, there was new life, hope and joy.

Yes, there is good news! This we can affirm even as we are living in very unsettling and anxious times, in the middle of the coronavirus pandemic. We may live in “Good Friday” times, with

bad news feeling very real and close to us, as it affects our day to day lives, but we are Easter people. We believe that even in the midst of all the bad news there is the good news of hope, of new life, of new beginnings and possibilities. Yes, even in the midst of this pandemic, which is really bad news, we already see signs of Easter, hints that “we shall overcome”and hope wells up in us.

Today, in the midst of the pandemic there are many, many people who are witnessing to the good news by the way they face the challenges of the crisis and who are making extraordinary sacrifices to help those who are most vulnerable and in need. Think of the health workers, doctors, nurses, paramedics, carers and those who work to keep all essential services running, who work on the frontline to save lives, to care for young and old. Think also of all the organizations, charities, churches that are reaching out to offer support as well as all the local neighbourly initiatives that have sprung up to make sure no one has to feel isolated and abandoned.

Yes, many people, whether they are Christian or people of other faiths or none, show that the Easter message is true. Life is about life, not death. Death and the death dealing powers in the world, whether they be human, systemic, or a microscopic virus, do not have the final word, life has! That is what the Easter story tells us.

The Easter story is about good news and bad news, of pain and of new life, and it is clear that the good is far more powerful than the bad. Everywhere in the Bible there is talk of the importance of good news. If you count it there are 44 verses in the Bible that speak of good news, in the books of Samuel, 1 Kings, 2 Kings, Proverbs, Isaiah, Nahum, Matthew, Mark, Luke, Acts, Romans, Thessalonians, and Hebrews. Mark even introduces his gospel

with the words “The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ.” So even in this “Good Friday world”, and in “Good Friday times”, let us rejoice in the Good News that “Christ is risen, He is risen indeed, Alleluia!”

May you know God’s blessing at Easter!

Advice for Christian Aid Week

In particular, along with many churches, events such as Big Brekkies or Lent lunches, where food is shared, cannot go ahead. We are looking at alternative ways to virtually meet, share and pray with supporters over the coming months in the likely absence of physical church services.

We are working on alternative plans that will allow people to take part in Christian Aid Week in different, creative ways – by post, by text and online that strengthen our communities during this challenging time. In addition, we will be providing advice on managing risks with smaller sponsored activities, street collections and delivery-only envelopes. Christian Aid Week is our single-most important fundraiser, so we would welcome your ideas on how we can creatively show love for our neighbours at home and abroad, as a community.

FWO Donations and the Covid-19 pandemic

Some members and friends may be concerned at this time about the church collections and FWO while the church is closed and we are confined to our houses.

Our monthly Ministry & Mission Fund payment to Church House in London still has to be paid (£2,750) as do some of our bills for the church and Manse. At the same time our income from hall hirings has ceased and so we are reliant on the congregation for our only income.

Thankfully the largest portion of the FWO is received by Standing Orders automatically into our bank account and a lesser, but important, amount is placed on the plate each Sunday.

We are suggesting that members and friends who prefer to give by cash in their FWO envelopes continue to fill their envelopes as normal but keep them until such time as we can restart our services on a Sunday.

If you normally give your donation in the form of a cheque you can do the same or wait until we restart and give a single cheque to cover the time we have missed. If you want to give me a cheque at any other time I can pay them into the church account using my mobile 'phone without having to leave my house!

It may be a good time to consider making your donations by Standing Order. This can be done either on-line or by telephoning your bank. I will be happy to supply you with the church's bank details and help you with the process.

It is obvious that, along with the rest of the country, we are going to find it difficult to meet our commitments this year but with your help and support we shall get through this trying time.

From the Synod Moderator

This message is part of a letter from the Moderator's office:

There is a greater need than ever for the church to be the church, though. Because we will not be meeting together, we must keep in touch for one another and show practical care as best we can. This is especially important for the more elderly and vulnerable members of our church community, many of whom were already burdened by loneliness.

The URC's daily devotions are commended for your use. As a new service, we will also be producing a weekly service that people can use in their own homes. It will be available in printed format and with an audio recording, with the aim that the first one will be available by Palm Sunday. Sign up at <https://devotions.urc.org.uk/> I recognise that many in our congregations will not be able to access online resources. Part of your care for them might well be to print copies and deliver them. You may also wish to produce devotional material locally.

Be aware of those who will need help with shopping bought for them, either because they are practising "social distancing" or because they are "self isolating."

Friends, whilst for a time we must give up meeting one another (compare Hebrews 10:25), we must still find ways to encourage one another.

I know there are many practical considerations that I have not touched on yet. I will write more on the Covid19 web page covering many of them.

For time being, the Synod Office will be CLOSED to visitors. Staff will mostly be working from home, in accordance with the government's advice. One member of staff will go each day to deal with post, and the messages left on the answering machine will be notified to Helen Cavaco who will relay your message so that we can respond to you as quickly as possible. All of the officers are contactable on email as usual.

In closing, let me urge you to do three things:

- 1) Love one another and encourage one another daily
- 2) Do not be bound by fear, but take sensible precautions to protect yourself and others. I heard a doctor on the radio saying that he prescribes “five portions of fun every day” along with fruit and vegetables!
- 3) Pray for each other and the world. Please join me in putting that third point into practice immediately, using a prayer written by our Moderators of General Assembly, the Revd Nigel Uden & Mr Derek Estill: *‘God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.’ Psalm 46:1, NRSV*

As so much is re-shaped by Coronavirus Covid-19, let us pray with

- people left unwell, beckoned by death or bereaved;
- people providing professional health care and advice, looking after loved ones at home or working to create treatments and cures;
- people shaping the response of nations and neighbourhoods, of commerce and industry, of service and voluntary organisations and of communities of faith;
- people who are anxious or afraid, alone or isolated.

Living, loving God,
we praise you,
and through times of peril we lean into you,
for in Jesus Christ
you have trodden paths as difficult as ours,
revealing there a love that nothing defeats,
a love that bears us through.
Even as we strive to behave responsibly,
and to care reliably,
so we feel after you
that in these uncertain times we might trust you are with us,

our refuge and strength,
and our faith, hope and love might be renewed,
through Jesus Christ, Amen.
