

Scripture Reading: Jonah 3: 1-10

Reflection: We pick up the well-known and humorous story of Jonah when he is called for a second time to go to Nineveh. We know what happened the first time. Jonah went the opposite way, as far as possible from that sinful town which he considered far beyond God's mercy. While on a ship to Tarshish a storm arises. After praying in vain the sailors realize that Jonah's God is responsible for the potentially deadly storm. Jonah is thrown overboard, spends three days in the belly of a fish and is then spewed back on dry land. That's when “God came to Jonah a second time”

Jonah goes to Nineveh and announces that the city will be destroyed. Hearing Jonah's warning the people have a change of heart and the king tells all his subjects, including the animals, to repent. The king says, “**Who knows**, God might change God's mind” And they repent, and Nineveh is spared, which greatly frustrates Jonah.

“Who knows?” It is an interesting question; it is the question we come to when we realize we have to change our ways, that God is calling us towards a different, a new future but we do not know yet exactly what and how. Just like the king’s question expresses the uncertainty about what may happen, while calling his people to take a bold step towards a new future.

“Who knows?” This is the question we hesitantly ask when we dare to look beyond our “normal” lives, our familiar worldview, recognizing that after the corona crisis, when we have found a vaccine against Covid-19, we cannot go back to business as usual. The world *has* to change, our lives have to change; this time in lockdown gives us time to reflect what kind of world we want to live in. We are faced with the question “who knows?” as we find ourselves at a crossroad. And unsettling as this may be, we know that we are not alone; God is present with us (cf Psalm 139).

Like the Ninevites, we have come to realize that we are on a wrong path; the great social and economic inequalities in our society and the world have become even more evident, the poor and vulnerable in our society and in the world are suffering and will suffer more because of the worldwide economic recession, global warming with its disastrous consequences cannot be ignored and radical action has to be taken.....We have a vision which the biblical stories present to us, of peace and justice for all and this vision should guide us as we try to find the right way forward to the future.

“Who knows?” allows us to be open to new ideas, to try new things, and to re-evaluate who and what is really important and how we respect them/it. Who knows, God might change God’s mind. Or perhaps we should rather say, who knows, God might change our minds. That is possible! The Ninevites changed their ways when

Jonah finally brought God’s message to them. We can change our minds and our ways. Who knows? Anything can happen if we continue to believe that God’s Spirit is at work in our midst. Anything can happen if we continue to be inspired to act for peace and justice for all.

Who knows what the future has in store for us, but the question “who knows?” gives us strength not to conform to the ways of the world if they are contrary to the vision of peace and justice that we work towards. The question “who knows?” leads us, as followers of Jesus, to explore new ways to “another world that is possible!” Yes, **who knows?!**
