Worship 17 May

Welcome to this worship on the 6th Sunday of the season of Easter. It means that in a few days' time is the feast of the Ascension. Ascension never falls on a Sunday - it is celebrated 40 days after Easter - and it is not a feast day that we give much attention to in our church. For if we celebrate the Ascension, we are celebrating Jesus leaving us. And who wants to celebrate that? Who wants to celebrate being left alone? Who wants to celebrate that Jesus commanded the disciples to be his witnesses "in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth"—and then immediately left them to do it on their own? So no wonder we do not care much about Ascension. We already know too well the pain of goodbyes, loss and loneliness? Why would we want to celebrate Christ leaving us too? But perhaps Ascension is not so much about Jesus leaving us but rather finding him everywhere on earth, if we only stop looking up but rather look around us.

Reading Acts 1: 1-11

Reflection

Do you know that the two most prominent Biblical scenes painted in the Middle Ages were the virgin birth and the ascension of Jesus? Why these two scenes? Because they frame Jesus' earthly life – his arrival in the world and his departure. And throughout history, Christians have continued to look into the sky – awaiting Jesus' return. But why look up? Are we not to look elsewhere for Jesus? And here I will quote my favourite preacher and writer Barbara Brown Taylor in Gospel Medicine: "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven?" That is what the two men in white robes said to the disciples on the mount called Olivet just outside of Jerusalem. Luke calls them men in white

robes...but you can bet they were angels – angels sent to remind God's friends that if they wanted to see him again, it was no use looking up. Better they should look around instead, at each other, at the world, at the ordinary people in their ordinary lives, because that was where they were most likely to find him – not the way they used to know him, but the new way, not in his own body but in their bodies, the risen, the ascended Lord who was no longer anywhere on earth so that he could be everywhere instead. No one standing around watching them that day could have guessed what an astounding thing happened when they all stopped looking into the sky and looked at each other instead. On the surface, it was not a great moment: 11 abandoned disciples with nothing to show for all their following. But in the days and years to come it would become very apparent what had happened to them. With nothing but a promise and prayer, those 11 people consented to become the church, and nothing was ever the same again, beginning with them....The disciples became apostles, witnesses of the risen Lord by the power of the Holy Spirit, and nothing was ever the same again. That probably was not the way they would have planned it......He went away - he was taken away - and they stood looking up toward heaven. Then they stopped looking up toward heaven, looked at each other instead, and got on with the business of being the church. And once they did that, surprising things began to happen. They began to say things that sounded like him [Jesus]. and they began to do things they had never seen anyone but him do before. They became brave and capable and wise. Whenever two or three of them got together it was

always as if there was someone else in the room with them whom they could not see – the strong abiding presence of the absent one....."

The ascension has made Jesus present to us in ways we never dreamed of, if we only look around us and when we see Christ among us and in each other. And if you still doubt, remember we were not left without a promise, that of the presence of the Spirit to guide and empower us and whose coming we will celebrate at Pentecost. Thanks be to God!
