From the Church Secretary

Dear friends

It is very encouraging to have a candidate for our ministry so soon after the vacancy was officially declared, even though it feels as though we have been in vacancy for a long time, and many of us have found this period, even with David's time with us, tiring and discouraging.

I suppose we need to repeat what was said two years ago, when we agreed to call David: a minister won't solve all our problems, and however tired we are, we won't be able to sit back and let the minister do it. Ministerial time will be split between three churches—and Mark Tubby is required to move on from Weoley Castle next year, so Weoley Castle will need more support than they currently do.

In the six weeks or so between now and the weekend when we meet and hear the candidate, we need to pray for ourselves, for the pastorate and for the candidate, so that everyone makes the right choice as guided by the Spirit. We also need to remind ourselves that we are not obliged to call the first candidate unless we truly judge that they are the right person for the pastorate ministry.

To be positive, a new look at things and a fresh approach could enliven us all, so long as we are willing to try something new and maybe even give up something old.

Some interesting points have come from digitising the church histories compiled in 1983 and 2008: First, that a group of Presbyterians began holding regular Sunday worship 100 years ago in June 1918, while World War I still had several months to run. Another is that we were originally called Weoley Hill Village Church, with all Christians welcome to join, although worship and ethos were broadly Presbyterian, there being no other free churches in the area then. Weoley Hill Church was begun largely as a church for the Selly Oak Colleges, and the college association was very strong for decades: the first ministers were full time academics and theologians and only part-time ministers or interim moderators. The 1983 history is perhaps a little boastful about the theologians and other academics associated with the church, while many of us still remember the wonderful people from other parts of the world who worshipped with us at different times.

There are drawbacks to this. We could seem to exclude or at least devalue people who weren't quite so academic. And when the Colleges closed, perhaps we never really replaced that association with anything else or became anything else. I hope, though, that we have held to the tradition of openness, and note that many of us came here from other denominations.

So we don't have to wait for a minister, noted academic or not, to try something new—or even something old. More than one person has recently mentioned the house groups that used to be an important part of our church life—perhaps it's time to return to that tradition in some form. Traditional Bible study/ prayer/ discussion groups; 'just' tea and chat with neighbours, church members or not; special interest groups (green issues, gardening, books?) or any number of discussion topics, or support for people who need it— and not forgetting an Open the Book group if we manage to get one going. We don't need a minister for this, but a minister would surely be glad to see it. Another 'something old' might be dividing into study/ discussion groups on occasional Sunday mornings as part of worship.

So let's pray, together and separately, for ourselves, for the Pastorate, for this candidate and any others there might be, and for the Spirit's guidance now and in the future.

FRIENDSHIP GROUP

The members and friends who attended the Bring and Buy for Christian Aid on Wednesday 9 May were sustained by contributions of lemon, carrot and fruit cake, plus scones with strawberries and cream as they browsed the books, bric-a-brac and plants on sale. There are no costs for this event as all items are donated and so we raised £152.20 altogether, slightly more than last year, which will go towards our total church contribution. Thanks to all those who contributed, and especially to Ted Forgan from Weoley Castle for his plants and all the cake-makers—Iris, Doreen B., Norma and Nancy. Some items left over were given, as usual, to the St Mary's Hospice shop on the Square.

Our next meeting will be the summer outing to Attingham Park, near Shrewsbury. This is a National Trust property with lovely gardens designed by Humphrey Repton, and an interesting house built in the 1770s, undergoing some conservation and refurbishment. This applies to the walled garden, now celebrating its 10th anniversary of new growth after being cleared completely of all plants, as well as items of damaged furniture and hangings. There is the usual shop and cafe, a plant sale and a Mile Pleasure Walk for the more active, but most is level and there is disabled access and a lift for those who cannot manage the front steps. There may be a buggy if necessary to transport folk from the entrance to the house but this is only a fairly short walk. Entrance is \pounds 5.75 for non NT members.

We will meet in the car park from 10.15 AM to aim to leave by 10.30; it takes about an hour to get there. A guide is available to give a short talk about the history of the stables, hall and grounds at 12.00 but you can join in or not. Please let Nancy or Lorraine know as soon as possible if you would like to come and can offer, or would like, a lift.

The Jubilee Debt Campaign

This month's retiring collection is for The Jubilee Debt Campaign. We have been supporting this charity, which fights for financial justice for poor communities, for over fifteen years. Although it has only five paid staff members the Campaign has been very successful in publicising the problems faced by poor countries in the global south which have fallen into debt. Recent articles in The Guardian newspaper has highlighted some of J.D.C.'s findings e.g. that " a study of 126 developing nations showed that they were devoting more than 10% of their revenues on average to paying the interest on money borrowed from the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank."

While still fighting for the financial rights of third world countries J.D.C has also now become involved in debt problems closer to home in Britain. The interest on credit card loans is exceptionally high and J.D.C says "The household debt crisis is driving poverty, misery, mental health problems and homelessness. And with the economic insecurity posed by Brexit and further planned cuts to public spending, the problem is set to get worse." The group is working with the Centre for Responsible Credit think tank and says they are working "for a write-off to tackle the burden of unjust debt on the poorest households, and for a cap on the cost of credit to tackle rip-off lending."
