## **Reading: Mark 13. 24-32**

### **Reflection Keep Awake/ New Hope**

Advent- a time of waiting and watching.

A time of 'New Beginnings

#### **1. Signs of Hope**

Fig trees- lose their leaves in winter but keep all the fruits that failed to mature on the tree. These will never ripen. Indeed, I think that they may even weaken the tree if left there. It is in many ways a reminder of hopes of fruit that were not fulfilled; possibilities that never came to fruition. I remove them. It is the time to leave old failures behind. Otherwise they weigh us down. The next season will be different. New exciting possibilities for us to harvest.

Now is the time to prepare for the New season, new possibilities. To make a fresh start- new leaves, new fruits- some of which will succeed. Advent is a time for us to leave old failures behind. To make a new start. A time to find new hope, to see new possibilities that may ripen and come to fruition.

Each year is different. Some years we have a rich harvest- a glut. Others very little

Our challenge is to be ready for either- and to adapt.  
To embrace whatever happens, to the glory of God.  
There are constant signs of hope and renewal and constant predictions that might transpire.  
Our modern world seems to be opposed to God's call;  
Opposed to the gospel  
Yet many people are yearning for something for meaning, for spirituality.  
And the fig tree like our churches is about to start a new season.  
Old harvests have passed, old failures are behind us  
New possibilities will come.

## **2. Being ready**

Jesus forecast destruction of temple- about a fundamental change- a new world without the old certainties.

There is much in gospels about readiness, and about unpredictability.

Life is full of unfinished business: If only... I was going to..... I could have.... I wish

We are challenged to be ever ready- constantly waiting and watching.

I believe the current Pandemic is a key moment.

1. a test of past readiness (or not)
2. an opportunity to serve our communities in a time of need
3. an opportunity to prepare for a back to a new and better normal.

It is indeed a wonderful opportunity to ready ourselves. To prepare for the work ahead. Time to build ourselves up spiritually and physically for the work ahead. Indeed to make a start now. Developing our faith, building new skills, making plans, starting projects.

The End of the world is nigh.... The End of our old world- old values, old predictabilities, old ways.

God calls us to start seeking a new world. A world of Peace, justice, inclusion. A world meeting God anew.

Are we ready? Are you ready?

### 3. Staying Awake

I recall during a stay in Nigeria. I went out for the evening and when I returned I found our night watch was sleeping. I remember the panic in his eyes when I woke him. If it had been robbers rather than me, there would have been no second chance.

Our Gospel passage reminds us that we too are left in charge of God's work. How does it feel to be left in charge?

Responsibility, care, alert, tension? Child, Dog/ house sitting, looking after valuables are hard enough but God's work that is something of a much bigger order.

His message about keeping awake is a reminder that we can never know or understand God's timetable. Some opportunities only occur once. We need to be alert to those moments. We cannot afford to be caught napping, of missing the moment. If we do, there may be no chance for catching-up. Think of a visitor to your church, to your zoom service. Think of someone asking you about your faith. This may be a key moment not to be missed that only you can respond to. We must indeed stay awake, alert to opportunities, to signs, to needs, to others and be ready to respond.

In his letter to the Corinthians, Paul is writing to the Church in Corinth. A community in internal conflict. He is reminding them that they have the resources, the opportunities and God will encourage them. They can achieve great things in His name.

1 Corinthians 1:3-9 New Revised Standard Version (NRSV)

*<sup>3</sup> Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. <sup>4</sup> I give thanks to my<sup>[a]</sup> God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, <sup>5</sup> for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind— <sup>6</sup> just as the testimony of<sup>[b]</sup> Christ has been strengthened among you— <sup>7</sup> so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. <sup>8</sup> He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. <sup>9</sup> God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.*

So ....we too are the servants of God, We have been entrusted with His valuable work. Here in our community and in the wider world.

The Good news is that we can get on with living faithfully. Liberating us from the need to worry- It is God's timetable not ours.

And we are tasked with being people of love, showing grace and openness. We need to watch but do not need to worry about when, because when should not matter if we are ready and awake for the moment

A New Advent, a fresh start, new opportunities, new hope.
