From the Editor—

To everything there is a season....

Summer season, exam season, silly season, holiday season, hay fever season, fire season, festival season, drought season, barbecue season, traffic jam season....

Life is full of ups and downs, we say; nearly everything, however good, has a negative side. Summer brings longer days and the hope of sunshine and warm weather but also brings grass and weed pollen and the risk of sunburn and heatstroke. Young people may look forward to the end of exams and the beginning of their holiday, but there is still the stress of waiting for results and the possibility of disappointment and failure as well as success. A wonderful family gathering may entail difficult travel or spread illness.

There is much in the world worthy of rejoicing—more children go to school than ever before, many once-deadly diseases can be prevented, cured or at least managed, we can talk to family and friends around the world in a way unimaginable in the days of the expensive, crackly longdistance phone call at Christmas. (I nominate clean water from a domestic tap as a top benefit of civilisation—praise and thanks to the organisations working to provide it where it is still needed and shame on companies that value bonuses and share prices over clean water.)

There is much in the world to weep over, on global and personal levels. Christians and others protest government cutbacks to food and health provision for the poorest parts of the world—and protest hunger and poor health in this country. We worry about climate change and the possibility another pandemic, of conflict in Ukraine and the Middle East escalating into global warfare....

Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep, Romans 12:1 tells us; not easy especially when we are called on to do both at once. How do you rejoice with and praise the A* student without making the D or F student feel even worse? Or support the one who didn't get their

required grades without neglecting the one who did? Do you keep quiet about your successful treatment because others are facing yet more treatments or have no more available, or keep quiet about your unsuccessful treatment because you don't want to discourage others or diminish their rejoicing?

Beyond the personal level, this also applies to a number of current issues, including the assisted dying legislation, expressing support for Gazans without antisemitism, and many difficult social issues.

And what about anger? Is anger ever justified or are there things that should make us angry? This is difficult for those of us told as children not only to suppress all anger, but that we must not even experience it.

Empathy is the word we are looking for, the empathy revealed above all in Jesus, who wept with Martha at her brother's tomb. The empathy that felt with the outcast, the poor, the sick, the foreigner, the sinner. And yes, anger on behalf of worshippers ripped off in the very temple by money changers and sellers of sacrificial animals, an offense against the people as well as against God.

Not, of course, anger because someone jumped the queue or left their donkey in 'his' spot or didn't move out of his way fast enough, but anger at injustice to others and disrespect towards the House of God. Give us the grace to know the difference in our own lives.

What really powers empathy and makes it effective is love. Love of God, love of neighbour as ourselves; treating them the way we would like to be treated, not doing to others what we wouldn't like done to us. This won't answer the question of how to rejoice with one and weep with another at the same time, but it will open us to the grace to express empathy for one person or group in ways that isn't hurtful to someone else.
