From the Minister's study—

Dear Friends,

How does a non-conformist church celebrate the Platinum Jubilee, the 70th anniversary of the reign of Her Majesty the Queen? You may well find this a strange question, but it was one that I typed into google search, hoping for an interesting list of responses but, unfortunately, that was not to be. Ten years ago I prepared a service of thanksgiving for the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II, and while many in the congregation were appreciative of the opportunity to thank God for her life of service, I remember well that one or two took offense as they did not think it was fitting for the URC as a non-conformist, "free" church (not the established CofE church of which the queen is the supreme governor) to celebrate her reign in a church service. And I do understand the hesitancy among (principled) nonconformists to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee in church, given the history of the relationship of the crown and the non-conformist churches. Of course, it does not mean they will not join family, friends and neighbours in street parties, village hall parties or parties in the church hall. After all, the jubilee is a civic occasion that celebrates the many years that the queen has gracefully and faithfully held together and served the country. Anyway, I do not have to tread carefully on the 5th of June, Pentecost Sunday, when in many churches the Platinum Jubilee will be celebrated because...I will not be taking any of the services in the pastorate! I leave it up to those who are leading worship on the Sunday whether they incorporate a jubilee prayer, or more, in the liturgy. The URC has produced an order of service with prayers, hymns and psalms to mark the jubilee which can be viewed on the URC website. It includes the following joyful Psalm:

Psalm 98 Redux by Revd Carla A. Grosch-Miller

Sing aloud for joy! Conjure magnificent melodies! Create meteoritic metaphors! Reach for the heights of beauty and the depths of drama! Use everything to hand all that you can make and all that you can imagine: stardust and earth dreams. the music of the spheres and the murmur of silence, the hunger of the heart and the hope everlasting. The Power within and beyond, the Presence throughout, the Wonder and the Glory call for nothing less than the full expression of all that we are and all that we have. There is no place on earth or in the heavens that has not been soaked in, tickled or teased by Divine Love. There is no living creature on earth or in the heavens

that has not been marked. grazed or embraced by the Divine Kiss. There is no song too lowly or too grand to offer in praise and thanksgiving. Bring your instruments: blow your horns, strum your strings, pound your pianos, lift Your voices. Match the roar of the oceans and the majesty of the mountains. Let all things magnify Holy might. Let all things reflect Holy light. Nothing is apart from, and all is a part of, God whose immensity, mercy and justice are forever.

And it also includes the following quotations from Queen Elizabeth for reflection:

'I know just how much I rely on my faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning. I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God...I draw strength from the message of hope in the Christian gospel.' -- Queen Elizabeth, 2002

The Queen, in her 1975 Christmas message said, 'His [Jesus's] simple message of love has been turning the world upside down ever since. Kindness, sympathy, resolution and courteous behaviour are infectious. Acts of courage and self-sacrifice ...are an inspiration to others. And the combined effect can be enormous.... We are sorry to report the deaths of Susan Cope on Tuesday 3 May and of Joyce Cope on Saturday 14 May. Please remember their family and friends in your prayers.

Joyce Cope: Joyce was born in Selly Oak on 4 November 1935. She worked first at Cadburys and then for many years in the social work department at the Royal Orthopaedic Hospital, making some lifelong friends there.

She met David in a Kings Heath diner when she was 16. They married in 1957, Susan arriving later that year, followed by son Rob in 1960. Catherine was a surprise in 1980. Joyce always liked the idea of a little cottagey house, which they found in Fox Hill. She overcame a fear of flying to enjoy foreign holidays, Cyprus being her favourite.

She is survived by Catherine and four granddaughters, Victoria, Emily, Kate and Jasmine.

Weoley Hill members remember Joyce for her roles in organising and catering social events, including the Lunch Club, for her flower arrangements and fabulous Advent wreaths—and I remember Joyce, over 70 at the time, clambering up a steep muddy bank to forage just the right foliage for that year's wreath—and for her friendliness, as well as admiring her garden whenever we happened to call.

Over the many years David was in care, she visited him regularly. Another heartbreak was the loss of Rob to motor neurone disease. Her own health failed over several years; she was admitted to hospital before Christmas, but did not improve and was finally admitted to the Willows hospice, where she was well cared for until she passed away on 14 May, with Catherine and Victoria with her.

Sue Cope: Susan was born in Selly Oak on 21 November 1957. She grew up in Bournville, going to Dame Elizabeth school and Bournville College. She worked at the Royal Orthopaedic hospital both on Broad Street and at The Woodlands, working closely with consultant orthopaedic surgeons and the setting up of the Bone Tumour Treatment Service. She then moved to the Nuffield hospital to be the PA to the hospital manager and Human Resources Co-ordinator for 10 years and worked in various departments within the NHS Trust.

Sue took on the role of caring for Joyce, although they tended to look after each other much of the time! She loved cats, owned many and fed strays. Like Joyce, she loved gardening, and took over flower arranging in the church when Joyce was no longer able to. She was also an enthusiastic crafter, and often had a stall at church fairs.

Sadly, she suffered mental health problems throughout her life, and her father's dementia, her brother's motor neurone disease and Joyce's failing health and dementia took a heavy toll on her own health. Her family feel this contributed to the aneurism from which she passed away on 3 May.

- 2. Be present, encountering with authenticity and confidence, building trust with others.

3. Reimagine, finding hope and opportunity in the places where we long to see change.
