From the Minister's study—

Dear Friends.

When does Spring begin? Is it the 1^{st} of March or the 20^{th} ? I always get confused because there is the meteorological beginning of Spring, on March 1^{st} , with March, April and May being considered the "Spring months." But on the astronomical calendar the Spring Equinox falls this year on the 20^{th} and that is officially the beginning of Spring.

Anyway, from the beginning of March we can already feel that Spring is in the air. The days are getting longer, the temperature rises (although it can still be quite cold too) and we come out of our winter hibernation (metaphorically speaking). We go out more to catch the sun, we admire the colourful crocuses and daffodils and other spring flowers that have started blooming. We start seeing buds on the trees, signs of new life. And for those of us who wake up early, we may hear the wonderful early morning birdsong. Yes, Spring is a feast for the senses and Springtime is usually a really uplifting season.

One of my favourite hymns that mentions Spring is found in Mission Praise (a hymnbook that some of us love and others less so). It is No 348: "It only takes a spark, to get a fire going" and the second verse is as follows:

What a wondrous time is spring, when all the trees are budding, the birds begin to sing; the flowers start their blooming;

that's how it is with God's love, once you've experienced it you want to sing, it's fresh like spring; you want to pass it on.

This verse does not only express the joy one feels at seeing the new life that springs up but it makes the connection with God's love that comes anew to us every day and which we want to share with others. Yes, God's love comes to us "fresh like spring" and, perhaps like the "lamb in the meadow" and the "lark in the sky" in the Easter poem of Jane Tyson Clement, we "leap for joy!"

And we will also look forward with hope that God is leading us on a path of blessing full of surprises.

We were around before 'the pill', contact lenses, credit cards, email and the internet. 'Telegram' was not a way to avoid hostile security services knowing what messages you were sending. 'Application' was never shortened to 'App'; instead, your teacher said you lacked it when you

should have been revising for 0 levels. 'Twitter' was for birds only. 'Nectar' was for bees – and that was all we knew about 'the birds and the bees', since parents were too embarrassed to give 'the talk'.

'Satellites' were European countries behind the 'iron curtain', which was not what you did after spring-cleaning your living room. Senior citizens heard that sputnik had gone into orbit, long before humans walked on the moon. '1984' was a worrying prospect on the horizon and '2001 – a Space Odyssey' was a possible distant future.

For us, 'time sharing' meant togetherness, not holiday homes. A 'chip' was a piece of wood, 'hardware' meant hinges and screws, and 'software' wasn't even a word.

We got married, then lived together, and a house would cost about three times a single person's salary.

'Fast food' was what you ate in Lent; a 'Big Mac' was an oversized raincoat, and a 'crumpet' was toasted in front of a gas fire and eaten for tea.

In our day, you mowed 'grass', 'pot' was for cooking in, 'coke' was kept in the coal house and a 'joint' was put in the oven on Sundays.

All in all, I think we're a pretty hardy bunch, considering all the changes we've seen. After all, we've learned how to pronounce 'quinoa', to google any fact we may have forgotten, and use a satnav.

All through history, people have had to cope with change: several hundred years BC, the writer of Ecclesiastes wrote: 'Never ask: "Oh why were things so much better in the old days?" '(Chapter 7, verse 10, Good News Bible).
