From the Minister's study-

Dear Friends,

At a funeral recently I quoted again a reading from the Siddur Lev Chadash (the Prayer Book of the Jewish liberal synagogue), the words of which I treasure.

The great use of life is to spend it for something that will outlast it. On that condition, that we do our best to use well the time allotted to us, we need not fear death; we may even welcome it, when the times comes, as a friend. But until that time comes, let us prolong and enhance life, for ourselves and for our fellow human beings. So may we draw guidance from our faith to sanctify life, and to make it joyful. When we are dead, and people weep for us and grieve, let it be because we touched their lives with beauty and simplicity. Let it not be said that life was good to us, but, rather, that we were good to life.

It reminded me of the Bible passage in Deuteronomy 30: 11-20 that exhorts us to "choose life!" And so here a short reflection on choosing life, in the season of Easter when we celebrate our Easter faith that God is a life-giving and life-affirming God.

As the story goes: Moses has fulfilled his mission. At first he expressed all kind of excuses that he could not obey the call of God to liberate his people from slavery in Egypt. But in the end he could not resist (who can resist a call from God?!) and so he did what he had to do and the people followed him on the way to the promised land. Forty years they journeyed before they reached the Jordan, the border of the promised land. Moses could see the land from the mountain he was standing on but he knew that he would not enter the promised land. Once again he summons the people and says, "See I have set before you today life and prosperity, death and adversity. If you obey the commandments of the Lord your God....by loving the Lord your God, walking in his ways....then you shall live....." You can live yet be dead. We can be living dead when our hearts turn away from each other and from God, when we do not listen to each other or try to understand each other, when we fail to invest in loving relationships and live selfish lives, when "having" becomes more important than "being"—then we so much impoverish our lives—and then we die, even though we do not know it.

We are amazing creatures. We are complex human beings. We are impatient. We cannot wait. We do not always listen well. We do not share very well. We are fearful of the unknown (eg the stranger) and therefore we build walls and hide behind them. We find it difficult to say sorry—Yes, we have to learn "God's ways" because they do not come natural to us.

Is it difficult to know what God asks of us? Not according to Moses. You do not have to travel for it. You will not find the answer in heaven nor on the other side of the ocean. You only have to look into your heart. You can know it; you can choose it. Choose life! Bachareta Bachiyim! (in Hebrew)

Those are the parting words of Moses and they are very encouraging. We can choose life even though Moses recognizes that it is not always easy. For we are complex and conflicted people. Animals are simple. They live according to their nature. Not we people—we are all the time growing, developing, learning from mistakes, again and again seeking to be fully human and to discover who we really are.

And sometimes that journey of growth, developing, learning, selfdiscovery is sadly cut short—but with our Easter faith we can still proclaim: Because Jesus lives, we shall live also!

John Waters, husband of former member Cynthia Waters, died on 17 April. He was at home but had become more frail and extra care was being provided.



In memoriam John Ankcorn

John was born on 8 May 1931 in Birmingham and attended Saltley Grammar School. He qualified as a Chartered Surveyor and worked for Neale & Aldridge (later taken over by Lambert Smith Hampton), becoming a senior partner. In the early part of his career, he specialised in reviews of rateable value which required him to travel to Scotland. On retirement he specialised in the Landlord and Tennant Act and qualified as an Arbitrator for

rent reviews.

John married Lyn in 1962 and was very happily married for 60 years. They had a lot in common, both Chartered: John a surveyor and Lyn a Physiotherapist!' They had 3 sons, Timothy, Christopher and Matthew. Neale & Aldridge asked John to do some charity work, the start of the Birmingham Crisis Centre. There then were no places in Birmingham for women and children suffering from domestic abuse. From a small house in Handsworth the service developed to occupy a purpose-built refuge which has accommodation for 23 mothers and around 50 children with a large nursery fit for all ages. John's interests were varied: he loved music and reading, and played the violin and viola in a number of amateur chamber and orchestral groups. This led to him becoming President of the City of Birmingham Choir. John was invited to join the Birmingham Book Club, founded in the 1790s, and went on to become President, their meetings and company giving him great pleasure.

John joined the Rotary Club of Birmingham and become their president. He was awarded the Paul Harris Fellow Recognition for his work with the Birmingham Crisis Centre. The Birmingham Crisis Centre nominated him for an MBE which he received from the Queen in 2010.

John was a passionate family man and was given support by Lyn and the boys, one of whom needs extra help. (Matthew gets enormous pleasure from his weekly time spent at Martineau Gardens.) He was always busy but somehow found time to sail, garden and do a lot of DIY, sometimes with disastrous results! John loved animals, especially dogs, and in his eyes the family Labrador, Cassie, was best dog in the world! A message from Lyn:

The Ankcorn family want to 'Thank you all' for the enormous amount of work you put in to preparing and helping at John's Memorial Service.

We had NO idea how many to expect; but it was all your good work that all our needs were met! The Church looked lovely and welcoming – and all your acts of kindness very re-assuring.

I will be forever grateful that this lovely man, John my husband was given the farewell he SO deserved.

christians against poverty On Sunday 23 April we had Bill Wilson and Kristal Kierstenson from Christians Against Poverty (CAP) to lead our worship. Bill led the service and Kristal gave her testimony of how she became involved with the charity.

CAP is an organisation which links with

churches to help people with debt problems. It provides help and support to help the most vulnerable or needy in the local community. It also provides job clubs and life skills such as managing to budget on a low income.

There will be some leaflets at the back of church for you to find out more about the charity and maybe give to someone who needs help. The leaflets are: 'We believe in your church' and 'CAP's guide to coping with the cost-of-living crisis'.

There are people who volunteer to walk alongside people and if appropriate do spread the message of Jesus. This is how several people have come to be involved with the charity and there are stories of people becoming debt free in the literature.

I am not suggesting we become a partner church as that is a great commitment but hopefully we can support this charity in other ways. The cost-of-living crisis is a national problem and ways we can support this vital service is by prayer, capuk.org/pray, campaigning capuk.org/campaign-with-us, and donating capuk.org/donate.
