From the Minister's study—

Dear Friends,

Moving... we all have done it sometime in our lives, and some of us more often than others. Without counting temporary moves to university, I have so far moved twelve times in my life! And soon I will move again. After five years living very comfortably in the nice Weoley Hill Manse as minister of the Cadbury Pastorate my move to a URC retirement house is planned for a not-yet-set date towards the end of October. Yes, I am quite looking forward to retiring, following Michael who has retired already since the beginning of the year. But I am a little apprehensive too, of course, as it marks the end of more than three decades ministry in the church in the UK, the Caribbean and the Netherlands.

Anyway, we will be on the move again and with any move there are also the usual mixed feelings. We may look forward to the move when we are ready for a change (eg retirement), or when we feel called to new or greener "pastures" or want to live closer to family and friends. Or we may be rather reluctant to move and only circumstances, with or beyond our control, compel us to move (eg when we need to downsize or need to move to a care home). Whatever the reason for our move, especially further away, we always leave something or someone behind. Whether it be people or memories that are important and precious to us as well as familiar places where we shop, where services are delivered to us, were we socialize and where we worship! We leave behind the place which for a time we have called "home."

For Michael and me, Birmingham has been "home" not only the past 5 years but also the 11 years we lived here until 2010. Returning to Birmingham in 2018 was like "a dream come true" as the years in-between we often felt nostalgic and hoped to return one day to the city, a city that had been "good to us." While in the 8 years there had been quite a few new developments and changes, Michael and I still pretty well knew our way around the city and we cherished the good memories of our boys growing up and going to school there, of the churches we served and the ministries we engaged in, of the good people we got to know and befriended and of the familiar places we visited and enjoyed. It all continued to be so very familiar, so returning to Birmingham felt like coming "home" again.

But moving, it is exciting, but it is also stressful (especially when you are downsizing!). It is something to look forward to and something to dread. The Bible is packed full of stories of people moving from one place to another. It starts with Adam and Eve, moving out of paradise with their new address being "east of Eden." Abraham and Sarah leave Ur and move to Canaan where their new garden has some beautiful oak trees. The people of Israel move from Egypt to the promised land, a land flowing with milk and honey. Ruth moves with her mother-in-law and David, the shepherd boy, moves into a palace. And there is Jesus, moving around, having no place to lay his head, and Paul moves all around the Mediterranean and in and out of prison. In these, and many other stories, are the people excited to move? Adam and Eve surely not, but the others? There is grumbling, there are tears, but usually the move is necessary and considered part of God's plan. And often the move has a happy ending, with peace, prosperity and newfound love (eg Ruth) and a long and faithful life as the outcome.

Of course, in our present context we think of the many people around the world who are one the move, seeking refuge as they flee war, violence, poverty and environmental disaster. These are men, women and children on the move in the most difficult and distressing circumstances, and who are not certain where their journey will end and what place they will eventually be able to call "home." Just as we always hope for a warm welcome when we move to a new, unfamiliar place, so we should always be prepared to help "the stranger" feel at home in our midst.

Whether we move by choice, by answering a calling or by necessity, I do believe that God is journeying with us and gives us strength and courage, often mediated by caring and supportive people who help in the transition or at the destination. Michael and I have certainly felt your warm welcome when we arrived in Birmingham in 2018 and we were very grateful for all the help we received as we settled in the churches and the lovely manse.

While ministry in the three churches of the Cadbury Pastorate has not been without challenges for all of us (eg the Covid pandemic, break-ins at Weoley Hill and Bournville churches, decline in church membership and participation in events and activities, etc) it has been a real joy and privilege too and I will take many good memories with me. Memories of worship, enhanced by good music and singing. Memories of social events (quizzes, lunches & teas, church anniversaries and celebrations in all three churches etc) that were so well organized and very enjoyable. Memories of the Day Centre at Weoley Castle that is a wonderful outreach and brings together such a lovely group of elderly people. Memories of the few Away Days/Retreats we managed to organize as well as the meetings at the Manse. Memories of faithful church members and friends whose lives we gave thanks for as well as memories of faith stories that we shared in church services. Memories of how we continued to

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keep in touch and worshipped online during Covid lockdown, as well as the joy when we could meet again. And many, many more memories....

And, of course, I will never forget your friendliness, your good spirits and your faithful commitment to the church, its ministry and outreach. I pray that God may continue to bless you in all your good words and works and I trust that you will continue to faithfully walk the way of Jesus in your lives and as members and friends of Weoley Hill URC and Weoley Castle Community Church.

My last service will be the joint pastorate service at Weoley Castle Church on the 29th of October. But given that Michael and I may be in the midst of moving it seemed better to have the official farewell on the 16th of September, at the Harvest lunch at Weoley Hill. I hope many of you can join the lunch which follows a Harvest Service of Thanksgiving at both Weoley Hill (led by me) and Weoley Castle (led by Michael).

I do not say farewell yet, that will be done on the $16^{\rm th}$ and the $29^{\rm th}$, but for now I just send you all best wishes,
