From the Minister's study—

Dear Friends,

One of my earliest memories is of the pale pink satin comfort blanket of my baby brother that got lost. I must have been about 3 or 4 years old. My mother had taken us, my two brothers and I, for a walk in the park and on the way home she realized that the blanket must have fallen out of the buggy. Panic! My baby brother would not sleep without the blanket which he would rub and cuddle while settling down in his crib. The blanket was quite worn already but it was only that one and no other that would do for him. Anyway, we had to retrace our steps in the park to look for the blanket, but we couldn't find it. I don't remember whether my baby brother cried for his lost blanket (whether he had noticed yet), but I do remember that my mother had to quickly go and buy another blanket that looked exactly the same, or at least very similar. This memory resurfaced in my mind when I came across a sermon online in which the preacher makes a comparison between the comfort blanket of babies and the "comfort blanket" or "security blanket" of our faith, and she does so in relation to our Reformed faith. It immediately struck a chord with me.

Semper Reformanda. Always Reforming. Change, change, change. Sometimes I just want the security of that old time religion. I want to feel the comfort, the security that I once felt in the church. All this reforming is wearing me out. I'm tired of thinking. I'm tired of reforming my ideas. I'm tired of learning new things. I'm tired of all the questioning. I'm tired of all the questions. I want some answers. (Dawn Hutchings)

Yes, I want some answers too. How can our faith be meaningful in the world of today with its existential threats of the decline of natural resources, loss of biodiversity, global warming, food insecurity, pandemics, etc, beside the ongoing conflicts and wars, the effects of which are felt worldwide, as well as the economic crisis and growing inequality and poverty in our own country? In the past we may have found comfort in the church doctrine of sin and salvation proclaiming that Jesus having died for our sins we are saved, and a happy ending is secured. But we have come a long way from the easy answers of the past. So much of the security that our faith used to offer us has been taken away from us as our thinking, knowledge and experiences have evolved.

Perhaps we have to admit that for too long we have reduced Jesus to a kind of security blanket in the dogma and doctrines of the institutional church (of sin and salvation) rather than proclaim the truth "that sets us free." And how urgent it is to remind ourselves of the truth - the truth about Jesus who came "that we might have life and have it abundantly." It means that Jesus came to lead us from our many fears into freedom that allows us to leave our security blanket behind. Freedom from fear of the other. Freedom from the fears that cause us to band together among "our own" and in our comfort zones. Freedom from fear to cross boundaries. Freedom from the fears that engender prejudices in us. Freedom from the fears that cause us to hoard our treasures or that engender greed in us. Freedom from the love of God. In other words, Jesus leads us to freedom to live a different way, living faithfully and loving wastefully, without counting the cost.

And finally, a quote to ponder: There are those who prefer certainty to truth, those in church who put the purity of dogma ahead of the integrity of love. And what distortion of the gospel it is to have limited sympathies and unlimited certainties when the very reverse, to have limited certainties and unlimited sympathies, is not only more tolerant but far more Christian. (William Sloane Coffin)

Food bank needs

According to a recent article in the Guardian https://www.theguardian.com/society/2022/oct/20/uksbiggest-food-bank-network-to-spend-millions-on-parcels-thiswinter , need is rapidly outstripping food donations from the public and they are having to buy more supplies to the tune of £1400 per month per individual bank on average—some much more than that..

One of the reasons is that demand didn't fall as much as usual over the August and September. Even the limited numbers who have received additional government aid are finding it is falling short of necessary expenses (this being an expensive time of years for families with schoolchildren.) And as we know, the cost of basic food items is rising substantially, with high fuel bills to come.

So yes, please continue to donate food items for the B30 and South Birmingham Foodbank, paying attention to their regular lists of what is needed and not needed, but please consider donating cash as well if you can.

A letter from Peter and Lena Cruchley that just missed our publication date last month

Dear Friends

As Lena and I prepare for our move to Switzerland later in October, we wanted to write to express our thanks for the last two years we have spent living in the Manse (again) in Quarry Road.

You provided us with a safe place when everything was in turmoil: Dad had recently died; Brexit meant we had to return to the UK from Singapore so that Lena could qualify for pre-settled status; the pandemic had shut all the estate agents, and the URC would not assist us with finding affordable accommodation in London where the CWM office is based.

We were deeply grateful when Leonora got in touch to say 123 was available for rent and that you were willing to ignore the Synod lawyer's warnings about renting to an EU citizen! I came with some trepidation, wondering if there would be too many 'ghosts' coming back to my childhood home and somewhere so strongly rooted in our family and mum and dad especially. But it was comforting to be here and to see dad's roses still flowering, work in his study and be able to visit mum so close by and participate again in your life.

Leonora has been so kind to let me lead worship, where I have particularly felt close to dad again. In some ways this pressed me to feel I needed to keep some space, knowing we would have to move at some point, and so I don't think we have been very good members. Forgive us for that, if you had hoped we might have been more engaged. Even so, we have particularly treasured being able to bring mum to communion together. She does have strong associations with all of you still, even as she forgets. It was a shame the pandemic continued to make her participation in day centre so difficult. She hates bingo, but the kindness and chattiness she found amongst you all more than made up for that, and the obvious chocolate winnings!

We have scattered some of dad's ashes in the back garden and this brought some comfort in the moment to mum who, like us, was not able to be at the funeral and meant she was included, even though she has forgotten and remembered many times since.

As you can imagine we have complicated feelings leaving here again, and leaving mum. She has reached a state where her forgetfulness envelops her as soon as you leave, but the moment I will particularly miss is praying with her. It has been a lovely comfort that however 'lost' or 'found' mum has been, when we are together, praying has always been something she values and connects with. If any friends can visit her in Lapal House, she may not know you but is still jolly, especially if gluten free chocolate ginger biscuits appear and praying offers some comfort.

Dad had such high opinions of the World Council of Churches and appreciated its leadership on justice and faith, so I know my going there is something he would be so pleased and proud about. I trace my calling to mum and dad especially, but also to my formative years amongst all of you in Weoley Castle. And this step in my ministry is still a fruit of your life and ministry and I will continue to voice the passion and faith many of you recognise is in me because of dad. We want to especially thank Leonora and Michael. They are such exceptional friends and they have offered us such kindnesses along the way, grounding us not just in the community here, but in the warmth, wit and welcome of the Spirit. We will miss them in Geneva.

We tell friends of the exceptional commitment, faith and energy that is in Weoley Castle, that amongst a small number a larger truth and service is enabled and embodied. We will hold you in prayer in the difficult issues and times that lie ahead given all that is being experienced in the UK at the moment.

Power of Attorney

You may not have considered setting up a power of attorney—or perhaps we're just slower than everyone else—but as none of us are as young as we once were, this might be the time to think about it. We discovered, when the issue arose for a relative, that we probably should have done so years ago. Why? For one reason, people are more likely to have prolonged periods in declining physical and mental health than in the past.

There are two types of Power of Attorney, for health and welfare and for property and financial affairs,

It currently takes about 20 weeks after all the forms have been completed, signed and submitted to get a power of attorney approved, so do think about whether now is better than later for you. And of course, shop around and get recommendations if you can.
