From the Minister's study

Dear friends,

One of the joys during my summer holiday in France has been gazing up the night sky with the naked eye and through a telescope. During a weeklong heatwave when we only ventured outside in the early morning, staying mostly inside behind closed doors, windows and shutters until the evening, the cooler evening air provided a very welcome respite from the heat. At that time we would sit down on our lounging chairs, watching the stars gradually appearing until the sky was dotted with countless of them. [The Lord] brought [Abraham] outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." (*Gen 15:5*). With the help of a stargazing "app" (a type of software you can download on your mobile phone) our son could identify the names of the various stars and constellations, as well as the location of the planets, whether we could see them or not. And then there was a telescope, a small one yet big enough for us to get a good view of the moon as well as see Saturn with its rings. Even though the planet was no more than a tiny dot (with the rings just about visible) it was amazing to see.

When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is mankind that you are mindful of them, human beings that you care for them?(Psalm 8) Yes, looking at the night sky with the moon, stars, planets, satellites (you see them too, mostly moving although some stationary) is a truly wonderful experience. And to think that the earth is just a tiny part of an immense universe, a universe which is just one of many, is truly awe-inspiring. The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands. Day after day they pour forth speech; night after night they reveal knowledge. They have no speech, they use no words; no sound is heard from them. Yet their voice goes out into all the earth, their words to the ends of the world. (Psalm 19) And another great pleasure this summer has been to use an "app" that identifies the sound of birds. The app is called "Merlin" and has been developed by a lab that is claimed to have the largest database of bird sighting, sounds and photos in the world. Some of the birds I have discovered through recording its sounds have been the Goldcrest, the Pied Flycatcher, the Eurasian Nuthatch, the Short-toed Treecreeper, the Common Redstart, among other more common birds like the blue tit, the Coal tit, the Robin, etc. "But ask the animals, and they will teach you, or the birds in the sky, and they will tell you; or speak to the earth, and it will teach you, or let the fish in the sea inform you. Which of all these does not know that the hand of the Lord has done this? In his hand is the life of every creature and the breath of all mankind." (Job 12: 7-10)

While some bird sounds I would easily recognize (eg pigeon, owl, magpie, crow), others I would not have been able to place but for the help of the app on my phone. It is very enjoyable (and educational) to listen more intently to the sounds of the many different birds in their natural habitat. And once you hear the bird sound, of course you try to locate the bird that is singing, usually a morning song as the singing may stop in the heat of the day. So, birds have received my special attention this summer and, of course, a well-known bible verse has come to mind, "Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life? (Matthew 6:26-27)

"Do not worry...." Really? While Jesus' words seem to refer to worrying about food and clothing, which is a genuine worry for many, another worry many of us share today is about climate change. It seems that 2023 has been another record-breaking year with heatwaves, fires and floods affecting many all over the world. At the end of our holiday, when the heatwave in France finally ended, we also experienced an incredible downpour of rain, a torrential rain, which flooded the scorched land in a matter of seconds. "He provides rain for the earth; he sends water on the countryside." (Job 5:10) Yes, the land was and is grateful for the rain but at the same time these weather events are now so unusual and extreme, that they cause widespread damage and destruction. And it is people and communities that are most vulnerable that suffer most from a changing climate, so we recognize the urgent need for climate justice.

The Season of Creation is the name given to the period from 1 September to 4 October when churches are encouraged to have a focus on creation, with all the joys and responsibilities that being part of God's creation brings to us. This year the theme is "Let justice and peace flow" echoing the call of the prophet Amos, "But let justice roll on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!" (Amos 5:24). We are called to join the river of justice and peace, to take up climate and ecological justice, and to speak out with and for communities most impacted by climate injustice and the loss of biodiversity. And below is the 2023 Season of Creation prayer that I encourage us all to include in our prayers:
